



## PATIENT INFORMATION SHEET

### Thiourea

(T-026)

Your patch testing results indicate that you have a contact allergy to **Thiourea**. It is important that you familiarize yourself with this chemical and take steps to avoid coming in contact with it.

#### What is **Thiourea** and where is it found?

This chemical is used in photography and photocopying papers, hair preparations, rubbers, stain removers, mold inhibitors and flame-retardant textiles. It is also found as an additive in cleaners and polishes. Further research may identify additional product or industrial usages of this chemical.

#### What else is **Thiourea** called?

This chemical can be identified by different names, including:

*2-Thiourea, Sulfouren, 2-Thiopseudourea, Sulourea, Beta-thiopseudourea, Thiocarbamide, Isothiourea, Thiocarbonic acid diamide, Pseudothiourea, Thiurea, Pseudourea, 2-thio-, Thiuronium, Sulfocarbamide, THU*

This may not be a complete list as manufacturers introduce and delete chemicals from their product lines.

### THINGS YOU CAN DO TO HELP MANAGE YOUR CONTACT ALLERGY

**Be vigilant... read the product label.** Always take the time to read the ingredient listing on product packages. This should be your first step each time you purchase a product as manufacturers sometimes change product ingredients. If you have any concerns ask your pharmacist or your doctor.

**Test the product first.** If you have purchased a new product you should test it on a small skin area to see if you get a reaction before using the product on larger skin areas.

**Advise people you obtain services from of your contact allergy.** This should include people like your pharmacist, doctor, hairdresser, florist, veterinarian, etc.

**Inform your employer if the source of your contact allergy is work related.** You should identify the specific source of the chemical and take the necessary steps to avoid further exposure. Protective wear may be adequate or you may need to make a change in your work activities. Both you and your employer benefit when the cause of your occupational dermatitis is eliminated.

**"Google" it.** The internet is an excellent source of ingredient information that can be searched by product, by company and by specific chemical. Some helpful independent internet links
